You may not get everything you want in one college, so you might have to prioritize with your Parents, Guidance Counselor and Teachers what is most important to you.

### **GETTING HELP**

There are many ways to get the information that you need to make this decision. You can"

- Talk to people who know you best and who have graduated from college (e.g., parents, family members, teachers).
- Meet with you Guidance Counselor to help you explore options.
- Research college information online.
- Attend college fairs.
- Visit college campuses or take a virtual tour on a college's website.
- Contact the Admissions office and the office that support students with a disability.
- Consider reviewing books like Peterson's Colleges for Students with Learning Disabilities or AD/HD
  and The K&W Guide to Colleges for Students with Learning Differences on support services and
  specialized programs.

### **APPLYING FOR COLLEGE**

Application overview

The college application process can occur over the course of a year. Each college has it own application requirements, forms, fees, deadlines and acceptance procedures.

Most colleges will have an application form to complete online. You can apply thru the college website or by using the Common Application. The Common Application is a program you may use to apply to hundreds of colleges and universities.

### WHAT IS FINANCIAL AID?

Financial Aid is monetary assistance that allows individuals to pay for college when their own resources are not enough. Some Aid, such as scholarships, does not need to be repaid. Other types, like loans, do require they be repaid. There are four types of Financial Aid:

- Grants Aid that generally does not have to be repaid.
- Loans Money borrowed which must be repaid. Usually comes with interest and payment typically start after the student has graduated or left school.
- Work-study Employment that enables a Student to earn money.
- Scholarships Gifts and awards based on a specific criteria (sports, academic achievement, background, etc.)
